

ARTICULATION & TRANSFER AGREEMENT
between
COLORADO COMMUNITY COLLEGE SYSTEM
and
ARGOSY UNIVERSITY

State of Colorado, Department of Higher Education, State Board for Community Colleges and Occupational Education, for the use and benefit of the Colorado Community College System (CCCS) and Argosy University agree to the following policies and conditions governing the transfer of credit earned at CCCS into a baccalaureate offered at Argosy University. The principles, policies and guidelines in this transfer guide shall apply uniformly to all students attempting to transfer credit earned at CCCS into Argosy University.

For the purposes of this document, an AA or AS degree is defined as a two-year degree program of 60 credits, as specified in this agreement, 33-34 credits in the core curriculum, and the remainder from general education courses approved by Argosy University. This transfer agreement shall be published by Argosy University and will determine the decisions made in regard to the transfer of credit.

Section I: ADMISSIONS CRITERIA & PROCEDURES

A. The admission standards of the institution including the grade point average required for admission.

Students seeking admission to Argosy University must have a minimum 2.0 cumulative grade point average (GPA) for all college work attempted. All course work submitted for evaluation must be presented in an official transcript.

Admission to some undergraduate programs is competitive. While all students who have achieved a 2.0 GPA will be fully considered, Argosy University may offer admission to students based on their relative ranking of the college cumulative GPA. Courses in progress will not be used for calculating the GPA.

B. The treatment of the GPA earned at the previous institution in relation to the GPA established for graduation.

The GPA used to determine admission to a baccalaureate program will be based upon the academic policies of the University. The Argosy University may choose to use the GPA that is calculated from all institutions previously attended or the GPA at the last attended college. In either case, Argosy University must calculate a GPA the same way for all incoming candidates.

C. Treatment of associate degrees as admission criteria.

CCCS students who have completed an Associate Degree, who have been awarded such a degree, and who have maintained a minimum 2.0 cumulative GPA and a 2.0 GPA in all transferable courses shall be fully considered for admission into the baccalaureate programs offered by Argosy University. If the students are offered admission, the student will enter

C. Maximum number of hours accepted in transfer.

Argosy University has adopted a policy that sets the maximum number of credits that may be accepted and applied toward a four-year degree as 90 credit hours.

D. Residency and upper division course credit requirements.

In order to meet graduation requirements for an undergraduate degree, students must complete at least 30 of the required upper division credits (course number 300 or above) at Argosy University.

E. Programs where early transfer (prior to completion of an associate degree) is advised.

Early transfer is advised when students at the sending institution are unable to complete courses that are equivalent to specific degree requirements in a time period comparable to a native student's completion of the courses.

F. Treatment of the AA and AS degree in awarding credit.

For the purposes of this document, an AA or AS degree is defined as a two-year degree program of 60 credit hours with 33-34 of these in the core curriculum and the remainder in approved electives. Students who have earned a degree will be credited with the total number of credit hours for all courses that were completed provided that the total number of credits does not exceed the maximum number of hours accepted in transfer and carry a grade of "C" or better.

G. Maximum age of credit.

Argosy University will accept all credits earned within ten years of transfer. If a student earned credit hours that are required for graduation not more than ten years prior to transferring into an undergraduate degree program, these credit hours shall apply to the completion of the student's graduation requirements at Argosy University, provided the course covers equivalent material. Courses earned more than ten years earlier will be evaluated on an individual basis.

H. Treatment of community college core curriculum.

CCCS students who have completed the CCCS core curriculum, as certified on their CCCS transcript, are considered to have satisfied Argosy University's lower division general education requirements. This condition applies to all CCCS transfer students regardless of whether they completed a degree.

I. Accreditation requirements for transfer of credit.

This transfer credit is guaranteed only under the condition that the transferring institution maintains current accreditation by North Central Association of Colleges and Schools.



This agreement will remain in force until such time as the curriculum of a degree program changes or other admissions practices change or the two-year colleges or four-year college request a reconsideration of one or more points.
